

Handshake

UC's Career Platform

UC is connected with over 10,000 employers and has 6,735 active opportunities (jobs, internships, co-ops, etc.). Current positions within all 50 states and in 22 countries.

25% of undergraduate students and 11.4% of graduate students have activated their Handshake account.

43% of undergraduate students and 39.3% of graduate students have completed their Handshake profile. Once UC students activate their account, they are significantly more likely to complete their profile than students at peer institutions.

UC students submitted 70,519 applications for jobs, internships, co-ops, on-campus student employment, etc. in Handshake since 8/20/18. Employers connected with UC posted 22,673 opportunities, across all 50 US states and 68 countries, since 8/20/18.

CONCURRENT SESSION DESCRIPTIONS

CONCURRENT SESSION I 3:05–3:40

So you want to change your major? (427 TUC)

This session provides information about the Pathways Advising Center and the Center for Exploratory Studies (CES) at UC for those not already in Exploratory. Pathways & CES were established at the University of Cincinnati to assist all UC undergraduate students seeking to change their major with major selection process in an effort to promote student retention. While administratively housed in the College of Arts & Sciences, CES serves as a university-wide advising center.

Pre-Professional Advising (425 TUC)

Pre-Professional describes UC students from any major who have an interest in attending **Law, Pharmacy, Medicine or other Health Professions school after their undergraduate career.** Our advisors collaborate with students starting in their freshman year, helping them explore their options, prepare an outstanding portfolio, and then apply to professional schools. No matter your major, if you are pursuing a career track in law or a health profession, our advisors provide a critical partnership for you to manage this process.

City of Cincinnati (400 TUC)

Are you from out of town, unfamiliar with Cincinnati, or just want to know more about your city? This session will give a brief overview of what makes up the culture of Cincinnati. Different neighborhoods, activities, locations, and restaurants will be presented to you, many of which you can check out after orientation!

Accessibility Resources (210 University Pavilion)

Accessibility Resources is dedicated to empowering students with disabilities through the delivery of reasonable accommodations and support services by bridging post-secondary education with future real-world experiences. Students with disabilities who need academic accommodations or other specialized services will receive reasonable accommodations to meet their individual needs as well as advocacy assistance on disability-related issues.

Talking about Alcohol, Drugs, & Wellness (TUC Cinema)

Starting college is a time of new experiences, new friendships, and making memories that will last a lifetime. The college years may be your student's first experience with sustained independence, and this can lead to experimentation with drugs and alcohol. The consequences of these choices are more significant and more costly than many families realize. Join us for an honest discussion about alcohol, drugs, and overall student wellness, and how you can engage and empower your student to make healthy choices.

CONCURRENT SESSION II & III

3:50–4:20 & 4:30–5:00

Learning Commons (427 TUC)

Information for parents and students about free academic supports available to UC students, including tutoring, coaching, Learning Communities, and many additional opportunities. We will focus on programs that students can sign up for before they begin their first semester, while also leaving time for questions regarding programs that are available throughout students' academic career at UC.

Fraternity & Sorority Life: Brothers. Sisters. Leaders. (400 TUC)

Fraternity & Sorority Life engages students and chapters through intellectual development, philanthropy and service, and values integration and personal growth. Since 1840, UC has been home to over 50 national fraternities and sororities, and more than 22,000 alumni have passed through our community. This session will give an overview of our robust Fraternity & Sorority community, provide information about joining, and answer any questions you may have!

Campus Involvement (TUC Cinema)

Student Activities and Leadership Development is home to over 500 registered student organizations, 52 club sports, equity & inclusion education, including the Racial Awareness Program, a Leadership Certificate and dozens of other leadership opportunities. Our online student involvement hub, CampusLINK, provides UC students with access to every organization and many other campus resources.

Study Abroad (Great Hall TUC)

Offering opportunities as short as one week and as long as one year in over 50 destinations, UC International Programs is the university's central study abroad office. Last year UC sent over 1,800 students abroad, a number that continues to grow each year. There are many different avenues for students to earn academic credit through study abroad programs at UC. Students are encouraged to get in touch with UC International Programs early to ensure they find the program best suited for their academic, personal, and financial goals.

Managing Your Money (425 TUC)

Join the One Stop Student Service Center's cross-trained professionals for "Managing your Money." Together we will cover student billing, scholarships, loans and grants, plus general money management tips and resources to help you be financially successful during your time at UC.

Academic Coaching

Large-lecture classroom facilitation to help faculty create active and engaging learning spaces.

Learning Communities (LC)

CREDIT EVALUATION

Credit Evaluation

Even before you apply, you may see how your credits transfer to UC!

- Visit: transferology.com/school/uc
Credit earned at most Ohio and other area community colleges is available to search.

When you apply to UC, your overall transfer credit evaluation will be conducted. After you are admitted, the UC college that offers your degree determines if transfer credits apply toward degree requirements. Here are some general points to understand about transfer credit:

- **UC only accepts credits from accredited institutions.** Institutions you have attended must be accredited by one of six regional accrediting agencies:
Higher Learning Commission
Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools
New England Association of Colleges and Schools
Northwest Association of Colleges and Schools
Southwestern Association of Colleges and School/Commission on Colleges
Western Association of Colleges and Schools
- Check your school's accreditation: chea.org
- **You must have earned a D or better for credits to transfer,** unless the course was a part of a transfer module or a degree you have completed.
- **Your GPA from other institutions is used to make an admission decision, but does not transfer to UC.** Your UC GPA is based only on coursework completed at UC.
- **If you have already earned many credits at another institution, you still have to meet UC's residency requirements.**

Credit by Exam or for Life Experience

UC grants credit for qualifying life experiences or exams, including:

Advanced Placement (AP) UC's AP Key is updated each year. AP credit is applied based on the year in which the AP test was taken. Scores must be sent to UC directly from College Board.

College Credit Plus College credit is awarded for dual enrollment courses, including College Credit Plus and Post Secondary Enrollment Options Program, based on official transcripts sent to UC by credit-granting college.

International Baccalaureate (IB) Students receive credit on a course-by-course basis for test scores of 5 or higher. Test scores must be sent directly from the International Baccalaureate Organization.

College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) The applicability of CLEP exam results is determined by the UC College that offers the program. UC has CLEP testing centers at Clermont College (513-732-5219) and the Uptown Campus (513-556-7173).

Prior Learning Assessment After admission, students may be eligible to earn credit for life experience through the Prior Learning Assessment Process. Call the UC Testing Center at (513) 556-7173 for more information.

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 is a federal civil rights law that prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in the university's programs and activities.

Title IX Prohibits:

- Discrimination on the basis of sex, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression including: Discrimination against pregnant & parenting students, faculty, staff and visitors | Sex/Gender-Based Harassment | Sex/Gender-Based Violence | Stalking | Dating & Domestic Violence
- Retaliation against anyone participating in the process



